This year there was much to celebrate:

**Second Helpings delivered 10% more meals** between July 1, 2022 and June 30, 2023 than we did in the previous year. We re-designed our Culinary Job Training program, increasing retention by 11% over pre-pandemic years.

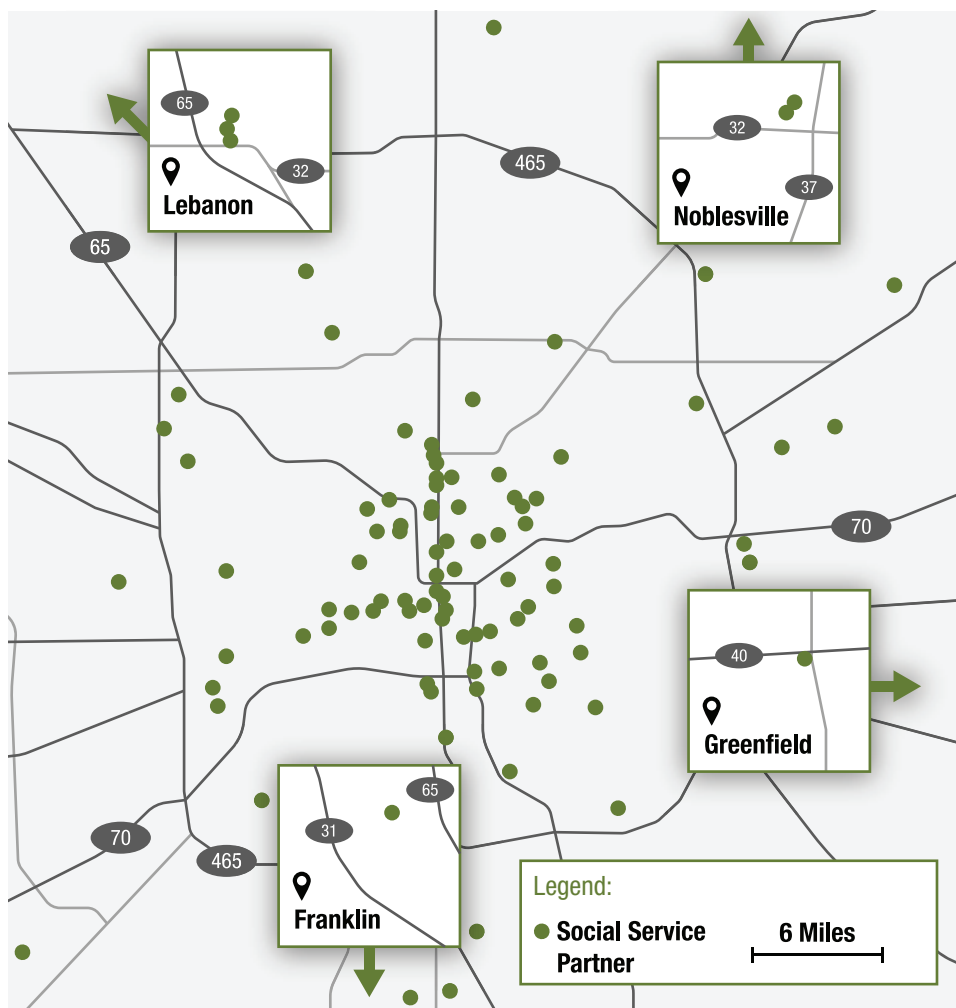

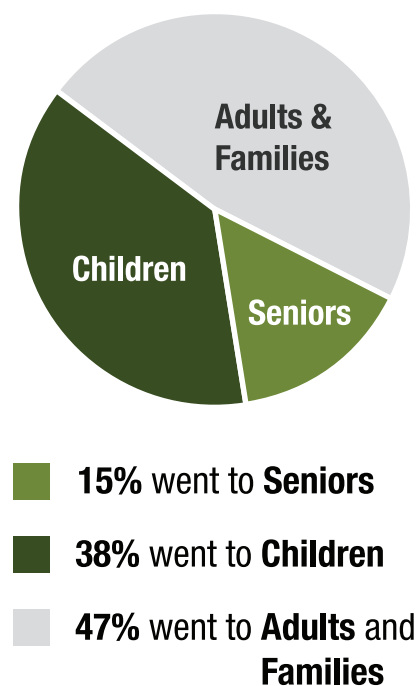


# We Delivered 10% More Meals than Last Year.

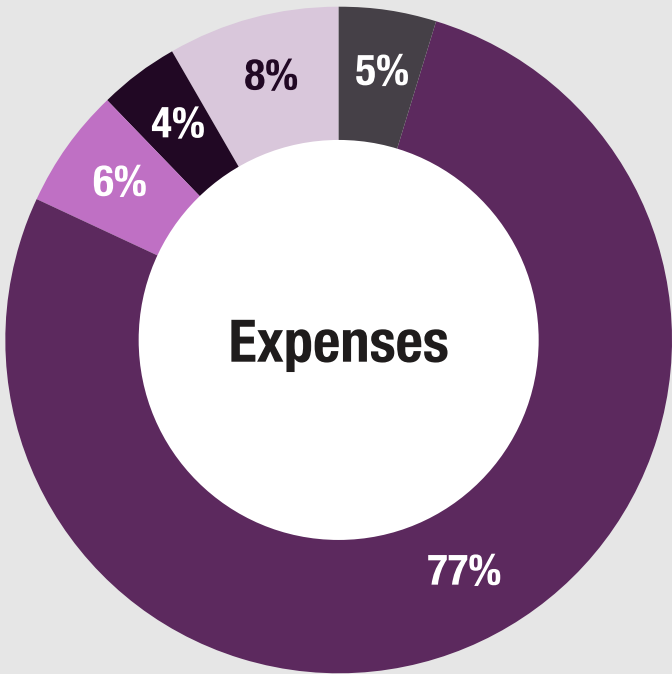
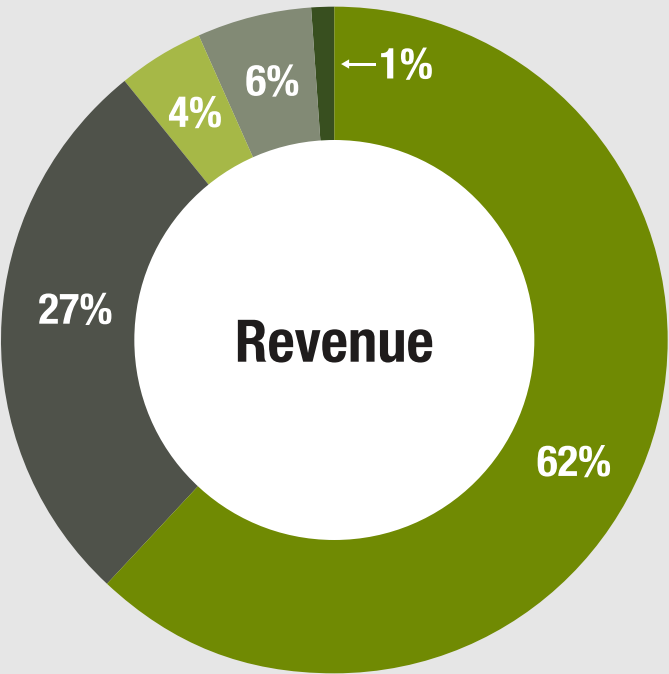
